Re: August 2021 Monthly City Council Report

During the month of August, eleven (11) vehicles were burglarized and two (2) stolen. These cases remain active criminal investigations. Marco Island Police Department detectives are working with our law enforcement partners from various jurisdictions affected by these same crimes. The vehicles involved were unlocked in all 13 incidents and both stolen vehicles contained the vehicle's key fob. The Marco Island Police Department continues to remind residents to keep all property locked when not in use. Residents should also report any suspicious incidents as soon as they occur so preventative steps such as targeted patrols, can be taken to protect our community.

Police and Community Service (CSO) officers continued to enforce City Ordinances. Officers administered violations by issuing warnings and citations to ensure City policy is being adhered to by both residents and visitors. Top violations included presence of waste receptacles, illegal parking and noise.

The department actioned improvements to its current technology. The MIPD underwent radio reprogramming on its 600MHz radio system to increase communication effectiveness on and off island. Additionally, police department personnel utilized night-vision goggles to assist in events such as missing persons and marine rescues.

On a lighter side, several officers spent time with families prior to the reopening of school. MIPD hosted Coloring with a Cop on Saturday, August 7th, providing refreshments and prizes to children. Officers who patrolled Marco Island via bicycles took the opportunity to inform community members about bicycle safety and rewarded children who properly wore bicycle helmets with ice cream cards.

August Police Activity

Crime report:

86 incident reports were written in August, which was a 60% increase when compared to last year. Half of the reported incidents were criminal offenses (crimes against persons, property, society and miscellaneous crimes). Property crimes represented the largest number of crimes in August; this was due to the recent surge of vehicle thefts and break-ins. All vehicles broken into were unlocked with valuables visible or in common locations, such as the glove compartments. The Marco Island Police Department strongly recommends island residents to always lock their vehicles and when possible, remove valuables from vehicles when parked.



Note: Non-Criminal incidents are reports that do not have a criminal offense or are information reports. Examples include fraud cases (outside of Marco Island jurisdiction), other agency assists, lost and found items, medical assists.


2021 vs 2020 Incident Trends

There was a slight decrease compared to the number of reports taken in August 2021 vs. July 2021. The overall trend indicates that incident numbers have remained consistent over the past year. Nine (9) arrests occurred in August, primarily due to batteries (both domestic and non-domestic related). MIPD works collaboratively with The Shelter in Naples and Project Help for victim resources and services.

On a non-criminal basis, fraud (banking, business scams) remains a concern with residents. In this case, fraud is classified as non-criminal because the crime took place outside the Marco Island jurisdiction. Marco Island Police Officers assist residents through resource packets and informational reports which are required by other institutions to start their investigations.



Traffic patrol



Officers issued 45 Traffics citations during the month of August. Over 80% of traffic infractions were written under the Florida statutes for speeding.

In preparation of school opening, a portable electronic message board was posted on San Marco Road, reminding drivers to carefully operate their vehicles.



Marine Report

Total number of marine events more than doubled vs same time last year and tripled vs July 2021.

As boating becomes a more popular past time with residents and visitors, officers continue to focus their efforts on safe waters. The largest number of interventions focused on speed control (manatee zones), followed by safe vessel checks. Extra patrols were added to popular areas, such as Dickman's Point for conservation needs (specifically garbage mitigation).

The Marco Island Police Department marine unit remains vigilant in its efforts to safeguard the waters surrounding Marco Island. A multi-agency event occurred this month when the MIPD marine unit, FWC (Florida Fish and Wildlife) and Collier County Sheriff's Office combined resources to remove a derelict vessel from Factory Bay.



August Detective Bureau Monthly Report Investigative Summary:

86 new cases were opened in August. Six (6) warrant requests were sent to the State Attorney's Office for cases ranging from frauds to thefts. Due to the diligent investigative efforts of the Marco Island Police Department detective bureau, an incident was designated as a capital felony after review by the State Attorney's Office.

Investigative Summaries:

Detective Bureau Cases

Sex Crime – a prior report of a possible incident was closed due to prosecution not being desired by the victim.

Sex Crime – A lewd exhibition report was suspended due to the victim not being able to identify a suspect. The suspect was reinterviewed but would not admit to the offense. There was insufficient evidence to establish probable cause.

Death Investigation – A death investigation from May was ruled accidental by drowning by the Medical Examiner.

Fraud – After a thorough investigation of a possible credit card fraud and receipt of records via subpoena, there was not enough evidence for a warrant request. Case status is inactive.

Fraud – A warrant request was sent to the State Attorney's Office for a scheme to defraud.

Petit Theft – Two (2) petit thefts warrants were sent for stolen property that was later pawned in Lee County. Case is active.

Investigative Summaries (continued):

Follow-Up Reports from Patrol:

Grand Theft Autos/Vehicle Burglaries –Two (2) grand theft auto and eleven (11) vehicle burglary related incidents occurred between the hours of 2 am and 4 am. There was no forced entry to the victim's vehicles as all vehicles were left unlocked. The grand theft autos occurred when a key fob was left in the vehicle.

Patrol Arrests – Detective bureau assisted with eight (8) arrests that required the collection of further information.

Self-Initiated Reports:

Operation Medicine Cabinet – Three separate reports for prescription medications turned in at MIPD for destruction.

Training:

- Officers Michael Garner, Anthony Pruchnik, and Johnnie Rosario passed the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) state exam.
- Sergeant Mark Haueter and Officers Paul Ashby, George Guyer and Rich McElroy completed a course on Youth Mental Health training as part of their School Resource Officer requirements.
- Sergeant Mark Haueter completed training for area or multi-agency emergency management coordination under ICS 400 certification.
- Officers Andrew Orcutt and Michael Berndt received training and qualifying certification in the use of TASER and firearms.

Reserve / Auxiliary Program Activity Hours

Reserve and Auxiliary Police Officers are unpaid volunteers who are certified by the State of Florida to perform in the law enforcement role. These officers must meet the Department's and State of Florida's annual retraining / certification requirements. Reserve and Auxiliary personnel are required to volunteer a minimum of 16 hours per month. They perform a variety of functions for our department and community which are outlined in the chart below. Particularly they assist full-time personnel at community events or special duty functions (requests for an officer to be assigned and compensated by the outside vendor) and during significant weather events such as hurricanes or flooding. Reserve and Auxiliary Officers provide an additional uniformed police presence in neighborhoods, commercial areas, schools, parks, and beaches. Once a month Reserve and Auxiliary Officers have a staff meeting to review policy changes, attend training and address planning and logistical requirements. The below chart signifies the logged hours that have been devoted to the assignments by the Reserve and Auxiliary Officers.



Code Enforcement

Community Service Officer (CSO) events increased 57% compared to the same time period last year. 88% of all enforcement efforts were self- initiated. A new training initiative was undertaken to increase case management efficiency and will be rolled out next month.




Time spent on patrol was equally divided between Code Enforcement and Follow- Up investigations. Notice of Violations significantly increased vs last year with the highest infractions being illegal parking and waste receptible removal.



August 2021 Code Enforcement Cases

The total number of cases closed in the month of August increased by 184% between 2020 and 2021.




The three most significant violations for the month of August 2021 include City Code Ordinances 18-36(8), "Placement of Waste on Curb", 18-36(10) "Overgrown Weeds" and 50-37 "Prohibited Parking". This remains a similar trend vs July. While noise remains a concern for Marco residents (67 calls for service were made), only 13 calls for service were validated.

August 31, 2021, Special Magistrate Hearing Cases

26 Cases were reviewed during August Magistrate. Over 40% of cases reviewed were building/ contracting violations (6 cases were from missing or damaged erosion control devices and 5 were for work performed without a permit). Sea Turtle protection ordinance and noise violation represented 5 cases each.

August 2021 Monthly Beach Report

Officers were on scene to more beach events this year vs last year (approx. 50% increase). Litter pick-up remains one of the largest events performed on the beach, up almost a 1/3 vs July 2021. The number of incidents per activity this month remains consistent compared to last month. The top offenses are glass on the beach, dogs on the beach and filling holes in the sand. To help educate the public of our beach ordinances, Marco Island Police leverages social media to post reminder messages. A less publicly known activity performed by our officers is aid to injured marine and wildlife. Our officers work with the appropriate wildlife organizations for their capture and transport to rehabilitation facilities. Most recently, Community Service Officers Chris Citarella and Anthony Ferraro rescued an injured Osprey and assisted the Conservancy of Southwest Florida for its safe transport to the Von Arx animal hospital in Naples.









