Re: February 2022 Monthly City Council Report

The Annual Officer of the Year ceremony sponsored by the Marco Island Police Foundation was held on Tuesday, February 8th. We were pleased to honor Officer William Prigge as Officer of the Year. Officer Prigge is known by his peers and community for diplomacy, integrity and professionalism. He is an asset to our community and agency. While Officer Prigge gained national notoriety for safely wrangling a seven-foot python hiding in a vessel, we recognize him for his many public service accomplishments. Some of his achievements included: locating and safely returning a missing 83-year-old man to his family, rescuing a 68-year-old woman from Marco River's strong currents, apprehending a reckless driver trying to evade law enforcement, and numerous traffic and DUI arrests. Congratulations Officer Prigge for this well-deserved award!

All law enforcement agencies are transitioning the way how crime data is reported to a new standard format. NIBRS, the National Incident Based Reporting System, will become the national crime data collection program operated by the FBI. The result will be more robust and complete data. Prior to 2021, Florida law enforcement reported crime data on a "summary" basis, which means if multiple crimes occurred during an event, only the most serious crime would be reported. All other lower-level crimes of that event would not be included. For example, if a robbery and a murder occurred at the same time and place, crime stats prior to 2021 would report the murder, alone. With NIBRS, all criminal offenses will be included with that jurisdiction's crime statistics, regardless of the crime hierarchy. Based on this reporting shift, we anticipate crime statistics across the country and in Marco Island to increase.

With any transition of this magnitude, delays have occurred. The FBI has been working closely with the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) to better align crime reporting methodology. Marco Island Police Department as well as other local law enforcement agencies have made significant investments with training, new records management systems, and more advanced hardware. Based on discussions with the FBI and FDLE, 2021 NIBRS crime data is anticipated for a Spring 2022 release. Marco Island Police Department is currently aggregating 2021 crime data through both reporting methodologies to benchmark potential differences and implications.



February Police Activity

Crime report:

90 incident reports were written in the month of February. One third of the written incident reports were criminal, consistent with the number of criminal reports taken the same time last year. 6 arrests made in February 2022.

This month experienced an increase with criminal traffic (driving without a license with knowledge), assault, and reported fraud cases. MIPD received numerous reports of stolen mail and identity thefts through stolen mail. The Marco Island Police Department increased patrol units in the areas where suspicious vehicles were reported. Communication campaigns through social media outlets also alerted community members to be aware of this occurrence and report suspicious activity to the police.

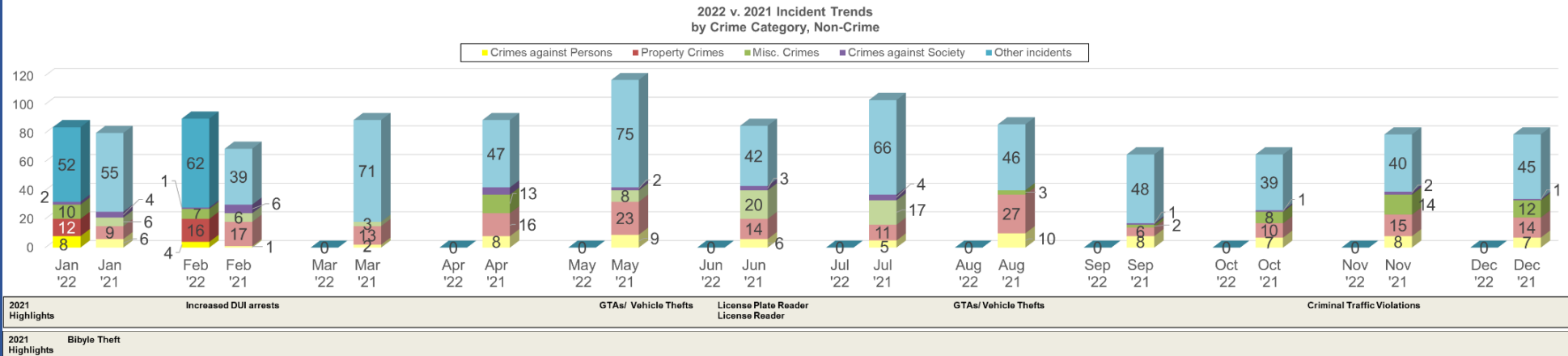

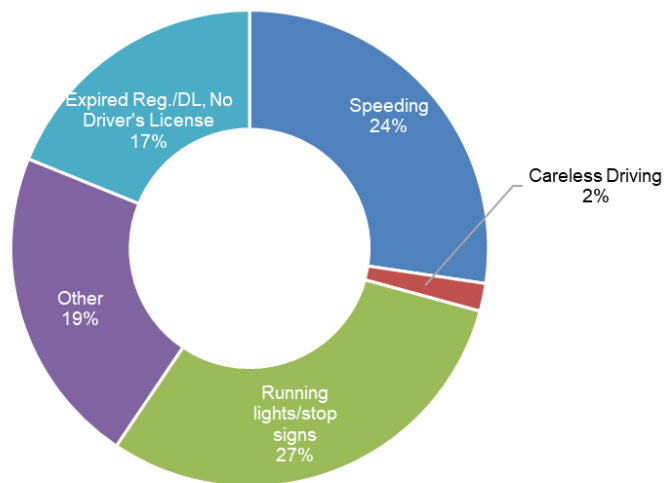
2022 vs 2021 Incident Trends

62 non-criminal incidents were reported in February 2022. Reports for lost and found property made up most non-criminal reports (16%), followed by individuals driving with a suspended license without knowledge (10%), and medical assists (9%)

Over 266 traffic warnings and citations were issued in February. Failure to stop at a light/ stop sign was the largest traffic infraction making up 27% of total citations issued. Speeding was the second highest infraction at 24% of total citations.

13 driver's licenses and 1 license plate were confiscated from motorist operating a vehicle with a suspended or cancelled license. 7 motorists were arrested for knowingly operating a vehicle with a suspended license and were transported to Naples Jail Center. 1 motorist was transported to Naples Jail Center for driving while under the influence

February Detective Bureau Monthly Report

Investigative Summary:

Investigative cases for our detective bureau increased by 30% this month versus the same time period last year due to more battery occurrences and theft/fraud cases.

Several cases involving mail theft occurred on Marco Island this month. Deliveries were reported missing to homeowners' properties and mail theft progressing to credit card fraud occurred. Several homeowners learned credit card accounts were opened under their names without their permission. Detectives are working closely with affected individuals and the US Postal Inspector. Extra patrols have been assigned to prevent additional occurrences and we are asking our community to call in suspicious behavior for police follow-up.

Cases Closed by Detective Bureau:

Sexual Battery – A warrant request was sent for a suspect for alleged rape.

Transmit Harmful Material – A warrant request was sent for a suspect soliciting nude photographs from an underage person.

Lewd and Lascivious Molestation – A warrant request was sent for a suspect who allegedly molested a child several years ago.

Aggravated Battery – An unknown male struck the victim, causing serious bodily injury. No witnesses could identify the suspect and no video surveillance could be obtained. This case was placed into inactive status.

Battery – A warrant request was sent for a suspect who allegedly struck a neighbor with gardening equipment.

Grand Theft – Two kayaks were stolen from a residence, but no suspects could be identified. This case was placed into inactive status.

Retail Theft – A retail theft was investigated, and leads were developed. The victim, however declined continuing with the investigation.

Petit Theft – A bicycle was stolen from Marco Island Charter Middle School. A suspect was identified, and the bicycle was subsequently recovered. The victim did not wish to pursue criminal charges.

DCF Referrals – Two DCF referrals were investigated, and it was determined that no crime occurred.

Criminal Mischief – A jet ski was tampered with, but no suspects could be identified. This case was placed into inactive status until more information is obtained.

Hit and Run – The driver of a hit and run was located and issued a notice to appear for leaving the scene.

Hit & Run – A dog was struck and killed by a vehicle which fled the scene. Evidence identified a lead but after further investigation, it was determined more proof would be required to proceed with criminal charges. This case was placed into inactive status.

Fraud Assist – A fraud report was followed-up on and discovered to have occurred in Naples. The case was forwarded to the Sheriff’s Office, the agency with jurisdiction.

Fraud – A report of fraud was investigated and referred to the Postal Inspector’s Office due to the funds being mailed to an address in Georgia.

Cybertip – A cybertip was investigated and suspended due to the offense being unsubstantiated.

Death Investigation – A death investigation was closed after the Medical Examiner ruled the cause as suicide.

Follow-Up Reports from Patrol:

Grand Theft – Report of stolen jewelry. Investigation ongoing.

Grand Theft – Phone stolen from package on front porch of residence. Investigation ongoing.

Petit Theft – Report of stolen dolly. Investigation ongoing.

Mail Thefts/Credit Card Frauds (Assist US Postal Inspector)– Several credit cards were fraudulently obtained and then stolen from mailboxes after delivery. Investigation ongoing.

Fraud/Petit Theft – Report of stolen cash and fraudulent use of credit card. Investigation ongoing.

Self-Initiated Reports:

Mail Theft/Credit Card Fraud – In the course of investigating several mail thefts, another incident was discovered and documented.

Identity Theft Report – A report was generated to document that a person’s name was used at a retail store.

Trespass Warning – Detective Bureau issued a trespass warning regarding a harassment complaint.

Operation Medicine Cabinet – Assorted prescription medications were removed from the public drop off site and placed into evidence pending proper destruction.

February Marine Report

Marine Unit officers observed an increase in boater traffic on Marco Island waterways during the month of February.

Officers Josh Ferris and Bob Marvin conducted vessel safety and sanitation inspections of anchored vessels in Factory Bay and the Marco River. All vessels followed Coast Guard regulations; boating safety inspection decals were issued.

Officers responded to three reported marine emergencies (MERT) during the month of February:

On February 10, 2022, Sgt. Casabona and Officer Marvin responded to Cape Romano beach on a reported medical emergency. Officers stabilized the patient and assisted Marco Island Fire Rescue (MIFR) Marine Unit in transporting the patient to Caxambas boat park. Once there, medical technicians continued treatment.

On February 28, 2022, Officer Marvin responded to a vessel fire on the Marco River. Officer Marvin located the vessel and assisted MIFR as they put out the engine fire. There were no reported injuries.

February Reserve / Auxiliary Program Activity Hours

Reserve and Auxiliary Police Officers are unpaid volunteers who are certified by the State of Florida to perform in the law enforcement role. These officers must meet the Department's and State of Florida's annual retraining / certification requirements. Reserve and Auxiliary personnel are required to volunteer a minimum of 16 hours per month. They perform a variety of functions for our department and community which are outlined in the chart below. Particularly they assist full-time personnel at community events or special duty functions (requests for an officer to be assigned and compensated by the outside vendor) and during significant weather events such as hurricanes or flooding. Reserve and Auxiliary Officers provide an additional uniformed police presence in neighborhoods, commercial areas, schools, parks, and beaches. Once a month Reserve and Auxiliary Officers have a staff meeting to review policy changes, attend training and address planning and logistical requirements.

Special Details in February totaled 316 hours, 34 hours from January.

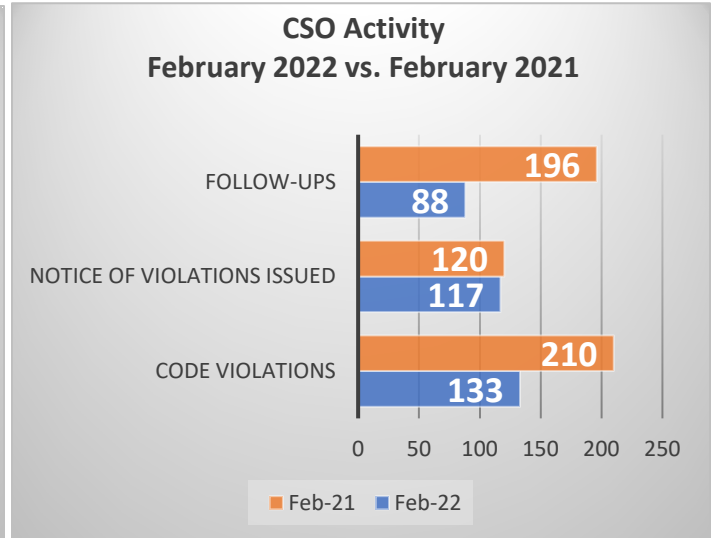

February Code Enforcement:

Community Service Officers (CSOs) responded to or initiated 450 calls for service during February 2022, a similar number of calls for service in comparison to last year.

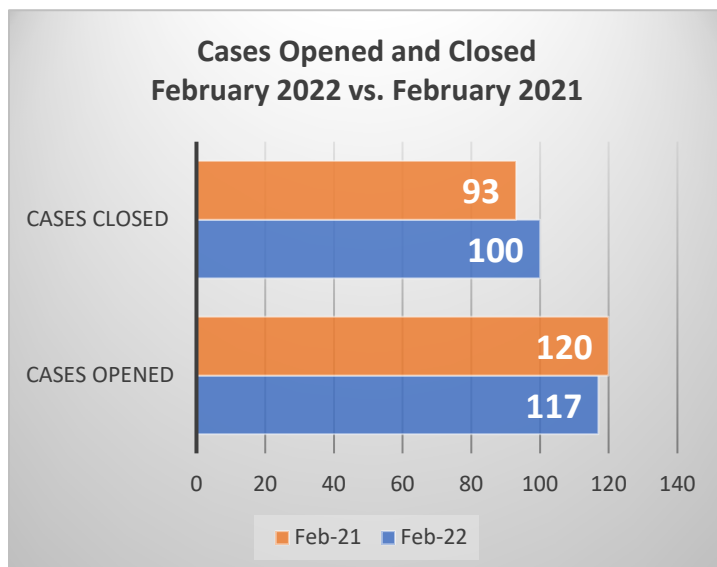
The majority of Code Enforcement efforts (77%) were self-initiated.

Approximately one-third of code enforcement investigations (35%) resulted in the issuance of a Notice of Violation. The largest amount of Code Enforcement violations this month continued to be for parking citations/warnings and placement of waste on curb. The need to obtain an RV permit had the third largest number of violations written.



February 2022 Code Enforcement Cases

The number of cases opened in February 2022 (117 cases) were similar to the number opened this time last year. Parking citations represented the majority of violations at 43%. Construction related code violations (erosion control, work without a permit, staging without a permit, illicit discharge) decreased 66% during February versus January. 43 noise complaints were made during February with only one verified for being in excess of the City Code ordinance.

Code Enforcement Protected Species Update

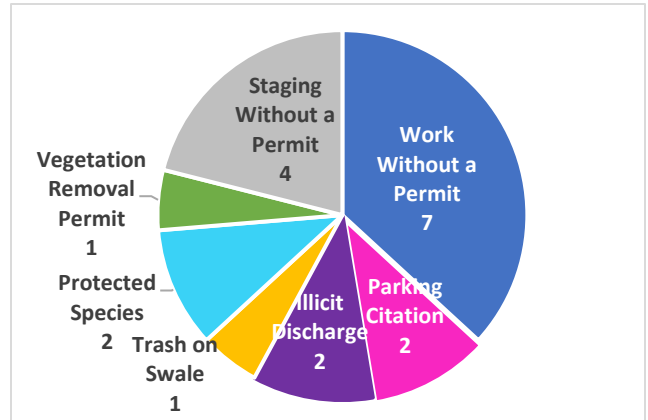
Burrowing Owls: On February 18th, the Marco Island Code Enforcement Department hosted a meet and greet for the Marco Island Owl Watch Committee. This occasion marked the two-year anniversary of Audubon Western Everglades' (AWE) proclamation from the City of Marco Island for their efforts at protecting the Burrowing Owls. Over 25 people attended the event. Community Service Officer (CSO) Warder, AWE and Owl Watch discussed collaborative efforts and the partnership amongst the organizations. Together, we work to protect and educate the community about these special creatures.

At the end of February, AWE reported approximately 337 owl burrows on Marco Island. 104 starter burrows were created by Owl Watch Volunteers; 25 of these starters have been successfully excavated by Owls. In total, 11 sites are active with chicks.

AWE reported more Burrowing Owls appear to be returning to construction sites during time of inactivity. AWE believes a possible reason could be that owls with burrows lawfully removed, are looking to return to their original location. AWE also monitored more owls setting up burrows in unusual locations due to lack of habitat. More owls are locating to swales; an area that presents significant risk for the owl and their chicks. The Code Enforcement Department is educating people about this safety risk through social media. Our Code Department also continues to remind community members to drive carefully; everyone plays a part in helping this unique animal thrive.

8 incidents involving owls were investigated by Marco Island Code Enforcement. All incidents involved parked vehicles within the 33-foot burrow perimeter. Education, training and verbal warnings were effective in resolving these violations.

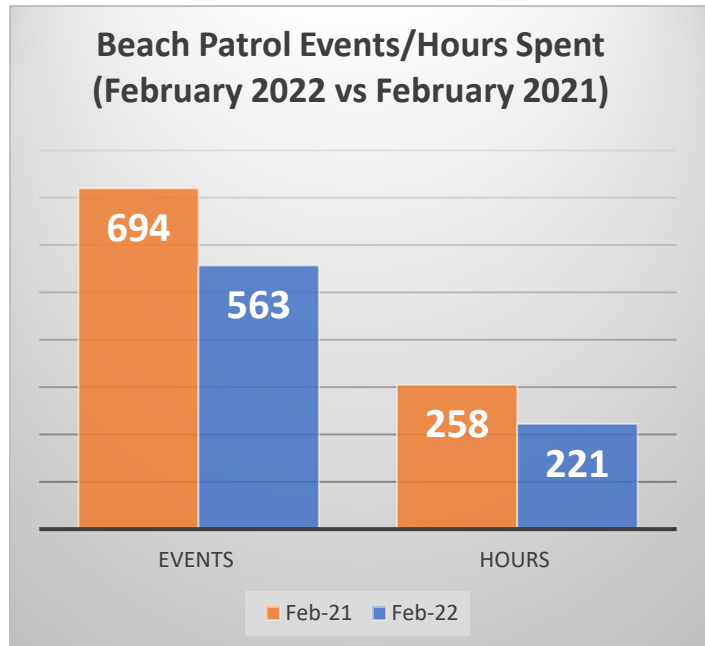
Beach Report

Community Service Officers (CSO) logged slightly less hours for Beach patrol, as they did last month. The decrease in hours was a result of their reassignment for Farmer’s Market traffic control. Patrolling the beach, debris pick-up and community-oriented policing remain the main duty focus for our CSOs.

The number of medical related incidents was higher this month in comparison to previous months. Not only do our Community Service officers patrol the beach to enforce city ordinances, but they also serve a key role for helping people who have become injured or help off the beach through transport. This month, officers have also enforced more boaters distance from beach swimmers, ensuring they stay 750 ft off- shore.

CSO Warder monitored 2 dolphins thought to be stranded due to tide, both were deemed in good health and went on their way.

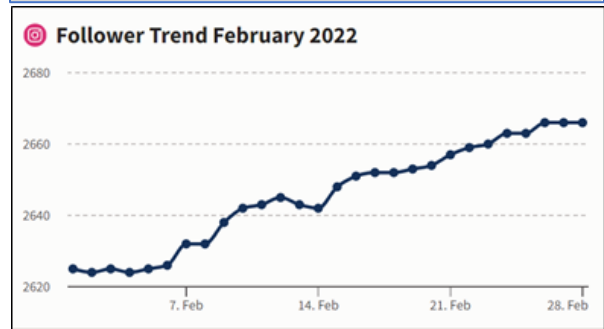
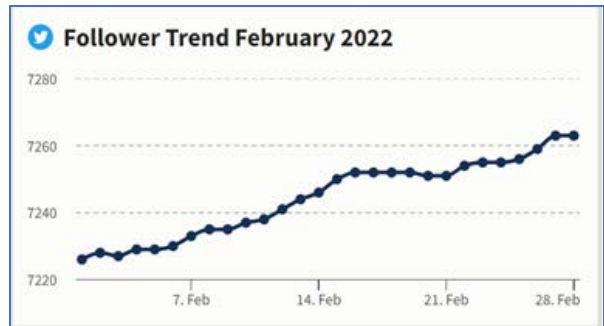
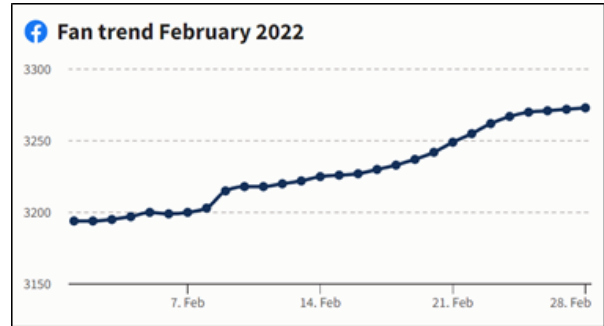
