Highlights for January included Tommie Barfield Elementary School children celebrating Law Enforcement Appreciation Day with our officers. Our officers visited the school and enjoyed the signs and treats the students gave them.

We said goodbye to one of the original members of the Marco Island Police Department. Sergeant Hector Diaz retired after 23 years of service with the Marco Island Police Department. In total, he served 30 years with law enforcement. During his tenure with the Marco Island Police, Sergeant Diaz started and ran the K-9 unit with his K-9 partners Sampson and Alan. He also was a certified motorcycle officer and a Field Training Officer, successfully training several recruits into becoming Police Officers. Sergeant Diaz was recognized throughout his career with numerous awards including Officer of the Year and lifesaving awards. We are pleased that Sergeant Diaz will remain closely connected with our Department as he shifts his duties to serve as a Reserve Officer; a law enforcement agent that serves the community in a voluntary capacity.

Officers Pruchnik, Monsalve, and Reyes were deployed to Sanibel Island to assist the Sanibel Police Department and community with Hurricane Ian recovery. Our officers provided additional security and crime prevention patrols.

January Police Activity

Crime report:

99 incident reports were written in January. Property crimes increased due to a chain of motor vehicle thefts. The Marco Island Police Department reminds all residents and visitors to secure their vehicles by locking and removing keys.

The Marco Island Police Department arrested 16 individuals in December 2022 for offenses including Aggravated Assault, Domestic Violence, Driving under the Influence and Driving with a suspended license/ registration with knowledge.



Note: Multiple criminal offenses may have occurred within some incidents in 2022. This reporting aligns with new crime data collection requirements from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the FBI. This announcement for crime reporting was covered in the February 2022 monthly report.

Non-criminal incidents are reports that do not have a criminal offense or are information reports. Examples include fraud cases (outside of Marco Island jurisdiction), other agency assists, lost and found items and medical assists.

January Incident Trends

63 non-criminal incident reports were taken during January 2023, representing two-thirds of the total incident reports. Most of the non-criminal reports were for suspicious incidents (suspicious people or phone calls), missing persons or welfare checks.




January Traffic Patrol

232 traffic citations and warnings were issued by the Marco Island Police Department during January. Most infractions (58%) were for the failure to obey signs and traffic control devices. The remaining citations were written for expired licenses and registrations (35%), failure to display a valid registration (6%), and speeding (5%).

In January 2023 the Marco Island Police Department arrested 7 individuals for criminal traffic violations such as driving with an expired driver's license (with knowledge) or driving without being issued a driver's license. 3 people were arrested for Driving under the Influence.

18 licenses and 6 vehicle license plates were seized for operating a motor vehicle with a suspension or revocation.



January Reserve / Auxiliary Program Activity Hours

Reserve and Auxiliary Police Officers are unpaid volunteers who are certified by the State of Florida to perform in the law enforcement role. These officers must meet the Department's and State of Florida's annual retraining / certification requirements. Reserve and Auxiliary personnel are required to volunteer a minimum of 16 hours per month. They perform a variety of functions for our department and community which are outlined in the chart below. Particularly they assist full-time personnel at community events or special duty functions (requests for an officer to be assigned and compensated by the outside vendor) and during significant weather events such as hurricanes or flooding. Reserve and Auxiliary Officers provide an additional uniformed police presence in neighborhoods, commercial areas, schools, parks, and beaches. Once a month Reserve and Auxiliary Officers have a staff meeting to review policy changes, attend training and address planning and logistical requirements.

Cases Closed by Detective Bureau:

False Imprisonment / Battery –The State Attorney's Office denied a request for an arrest warrant. **Vehicle Burglary** – Two unlocked vehicles were rummaged through at a residence. The case was suspended due to lack of further leads.

Criminal Mischief – Landscape lighting was damaged at a local church. The case was suspended; all leads were exhausted.

Follow-Up Reports from Patrol:

Death Investigation – Awaiting a Medical Examiner's final report.

Death Investigation – A death related to a fall is under investigation; a Medical Examiner's final report is pending. **Multiple Grand Theft Autos**- 3 vehicular thefts that occurred on the same night are under investigation; all vehicles were recovered in the Tampa Bay area.

Medical Aid/Death Investigation – A person from a medical aid call for service at a pool died at the hospital; an investigation is underway with the Medical Examiner's Report pending.

Self-Initiated Reports:

Death Investigation – The Detective Bureau launched a death investigation after being notified an individual from a medical aid call for service passed away at the hospital.

Assist Other Agency – Detective Bureau assisted Collier County Sheriff's Office with a citizen who needed to comply with a court order.

Suspicious Incident – Detective Bureau investigated a suspicious item left behind at a local business.

Operation Medicine Cabinet – 51.5 lbs. of assorted prescription medications were removed from the public drop-off site and placed into evidence pending destruction.

Officers assigned to the Marco Island Police Marine Unit conducted directed patrols of Marco Island waterways, city marinas, and boat ramps.



January Code Enforcement:



On January 10th all Code members attended an eighthour training of Green Industries Best Management Practices (GI-BMP) given by the University of Florida and passed the certification exam. All Landscapers working within the City of Marco Island were identified and notified of the requirements of the program.










Beach Report

January saw a small increase in hours spent patrolling the beach vs January 2022 and a 4% decrease in events vs January 2022.

With our beaches now in high season, our Code Enforcement Officers stayed busy assisting our beach goers with information and directions with a total number of Events at 112. Patrol Activity remains the highest number with 128 Events. We are always interacting with the community providing information and educating regarding the many species of animals found on our beautiful beaches.

Beach Patrol Events/Hours Spent January 2023 vs January 2022



Burrowing Owls- There were 25 calls for service for Burrowing Owls in January. All calls involved construction vehicles or cars parked too close to the protection zones. Code Enforcement Officers worked collaboratively with the Audubon of the Western Everglades (AWE) with these incidents.

- 8 were handled with education and verbal warnings. These resulted in immediate compliance.
- 3 had Stop Work Orders issued.
- 1 construction site, after several verbal warnings were issued, received 2 citations for non-compliance.
- The remaining construction sites are being monitored regularly.

Breeding season for Burrowing Owls officially starts February 15 and ends July 10th. During this time, the protection perimeter around the Owl's burrows increases from 10-feet to 33- feet of protection.

Other Birds- CSOs responded to 2 separate incidents of an injured Laughing Gull and an injured Pelican on the beach. Both were transported to the Conservancy by Audubon of Western Everglades (AWE) volunteers.

CSOs and Police Officers responded to a call for service concerning Black Skimmers that were intentionally killed on the beach. An employee from the Marriott drove through a resting flock of Black Skimmers, a protected species under the US Migratory Bird Treaty Act and identified as a State of Florida threatened species. This act led to the death of 5 Black Skimmers. One of the Skimmers was banded for identification and tracking purposes. The case was investigated by the State of Florida, Fish and Wildlife Conservation (FWC), the Marco Island Police and

Department issued 10 Notices of Violation to the subject for violating our protected species codes. The subject is scheduled to appear before the Magistrate in March. FWC is pursuing criminal charges against the offender.

Gopher Tortoise - CSO officers responded to 5 Gopher Tortoise calls. One Gopher Tortoise was run over by a vehicle and killed. The 4 other Gopher Tortoise cases in January involved either individuals parking too close to burrows or debris near an active burrow. Three of the incidents were unfounded and 1 Notice of Violation was issued for debris too close to a burrow. AWE was notified of the debris incident and a CSO followed-up with the contractor to advise him of the violation.

Within the month of January, 5 Gopher Tortoises have been struck by vehicles, resulting in 4 confirmed deaths. The Marco Island Police Department advises residents and visitors to drive within the speed limit and be aware of their surroundings to prevent further injuries.

January Code Enforcement Protected Species (Cont'd)

Other Species- While on beach patrol, CSOs were approached by a beach guest with concerns of an injured manatee. Upon investigation, the manatee was extremely close to shore and appeared to be struggling with cold stress due to the drop in temperature. Both Code Enforcement and AWE monitored the situation and contacted FWC. FWC advised against intervention and requested Code Enforcement and AWE to continue observation. The manatee eventually removed itself from the shore and returned to deeper water.

Enforcement: Water quality

Code Enforcement remains focused on Water Quality for 2023. During the month of January 2023, there were five violation notices issued for MS4.

Two violations were for Silt Fence, and three were for Illicit discharge. Two of the Silt fences were compliant prior to the Compliance date, and the remaining three are scheduled for February Magistrate.






