Re: July 2021 Monthly City Council Report

MIPD activated several initiates during this year's July 4 holiday to ensure residents and visitors had a safe and enjoyable celebration. Leading up to and during the  $4^{th}$  of July weekend, MIPD launched an extensive education campaign of City ordinances through social media, grocery stores posters (e.g., glass on beach) and "pop-up" visits by officers and our own Captain America to businesses and public facilities. Both police and code officers patrolled the island, successfully managing over 2,200 events over the long weekend (July 2-5).

July also marked the start of hurricane season with Tropical Storm Elsa. MIPD organized a public information team to disperse hurricane / tropical storm preparedness information and National Hurricane Center updates to the community. Administrative staff attended an Emergency Management training session in Naples, as a refresher course.

Officers focused on Back-to-School preparations at the end of July. All School Resource Officers (SROs) attended Youth Mental Health and First Aid training and select officers continued with advanced training (Florida Association of School Resource Officers; Crisis Intervention) that focused on legal updates, improved safety measures and best practices. Members of the department also worked with school administrators performing building security walk throughs and addressed safety concerns. The evaluation also included an interior and exterior threat assessment with recommended safety protocols for the new Marco Island Academy building. Officers dedicated an estimated 120 hours for school security preparations.

# **July Police Activity**

# **Crime report:**


Overall, July experienced a 68% increase with criminal incidents (Crimes against persons, property, society and miscellaneous). The addition of bridge cameras (ALPR) contributed the greatest uptick with arrests due to traffic crimes (individuals driving without licenses with knowledge). These individuals without licenses with knowledge either ignored previous warnings to renew their licenses or never secured a license. The ALPR cameras keep our residents safe by acting as a second pair of eyes, helping our officers be more proactive at removing risks from our roads. The new Challenger police car used for pedestrian and vehicle traffic safety was also active this month: on its first run, it made an arrest for Driving Under the Influence.

Note: Non-Criminal incidents are reports that do not have a criminal offense or are information reports. Examples include fraud cases (outside of Marco Island jurisdiction), other agency assists, lost and found items, medical assists.

### 2021 vs 2020 Incident Trends

The amount of incident reports written each month in 2021 remained more consistent vs. previous years. This indicates that police involvement in 2021 is experiencing less seasonal trends vs other years. On a non-criminal basis, almost 40% of July's non-criminal reports were for lost/found items and another 20% were for fraud (fraud occurring outside of Marco Island's jurisdiction).



# **Marine Report**

Total marine incidences increased vs last year. More marine officers patrolled the waters over the July 4<sup>th</sup> weekend this year vs last year, resulting in more vessel stops, warnings and citations issued. Six additional officers trained for marine patrol and will be deployed as back up.

Over 100 cases were opened in July, up 50% vs last year. 6 warrant requests were sent to the State Attorney's Office for cases ranging from violations of Domestic Violence restraining orders to tampering with safety devices.

### **Investigative Summaries:**

#### Cases Closed by Detective Bureau

**Violation of Injunction** – An ongoing violation of injunction was cleared after the State Attorney issued a capias arrest warrant for several reported violations in the city limits. Suspect was arrested and brought to court, and issues currently have ceased.

**Risk Protection Order** – This civil case initiated by MIPD and the city attorney has been resolved and the respondent has complied with all orders of the court. This case will be re-evaluated prior to expiration in one year's time.

**Sex Crime** – Report referred by Collier County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) of a 25-year-old male who fathered a child with a minor-aged female. An investigation was conducted, and the findings were sent to the State Attorney's Office for review. The State Attorney decided to not file charges in the case.

**Shoplifting** – A reported shoplifting was resolved between management and the suspect who returned and paid for the item taken. Victim no longer desired to press charges.

**Death Investigation** – A death investigation from May was ruled accidental from drowning by the Medical Examiner.

**Death Investigation** – A death investigation from March was ruled accidental from overdosing by the Medical Examiner.

**Hit & Run** – Investigators solved a hit & run traffic crash where the suspect was identified and admitted to the criminal act. The victim no longer wished to press charges.

**Fire Alarm** – A warrant request was sent to the State Attorney's Office for a suspect who silenced a fire alarm prior to fire personnel's arrival. The State Attorney decided to not file charges in the case.

### Follow-Up Reports from Patrol:

Sex Crime – An investigation is active for an adult male who exposed himself to a juvenile.

**Suspicious Sexual in Nature** – A teenager consumed a large amount of alcohol while her parents were out of the residence. While EMS was rendering aid, she made an utterance that she was sexually violated. The case is still active.

**Grand Theft** – The detective bureau is investigating two cases where the suspects stole items in Marco Island and then pawned them in Lee County. Cases active.

#### **Death Investigations –**

- Three separate investigations were initiated after the decedent passed away unattended. Cases are still under investigation and are awaiting results from the Medical Examiner's Office.
- An investigation was initiated due to an apparent accidental death. Case is awaiting the results from the Medical Examiner.
- An investigation was initiated after a decedent apparently drowned in a canal. Case is being reviewed and is awaiting Medical Examiner report.

#### **Self-Initiated Reports**:

**Operation Medicine Cabinet** – two separate reports for prescription medications turned in at MIPD for destruction.

### **Reserve / Auxiliary Program Activity Hours**

Reserve and Auxiliary Police Officers are unpaid volunteers who are certified by the State of Florida to perform in the law enforcement role. These officers must meet the Department's and State of Florida's annual retraining / certification requirements. Reserve and Auxiliary personnel are required to volunteer a minimum of 16 hours per month. They perform a variety of functions for our department and community which are outlined in the chart below. Particularly they assist full-time personnel at community events or special duty functions (requests for an officer to be assigned and compensated by the outside vendor) and during significant weather events such as hurricanes or flooding. Reserve and Auxiliary Officers provide an additional uniformed police presence in neighborhoods, commercial areas, schools, parks, and beaches. Once a month Reserve and Auxiliary Officers have a staff meeting to review policy changes, attend training and address planning and logistical requirements. The below chart signifies the logged hours that have been devoted to the assignments by the Reserve and Auxiliary Officers.






### **Code Enforcement**

The following includes information about the types of violations investigated by Code Enforcement Officers, as well as types of violations scheduled to be heard at the City of Marco Island Special Magistrate Hearing. An important distinction to note for the month of July 2021 is the implementation of Florida law (SB60) which "amends the county and municipal code enforcement inspectors and code enforcement officers from initiating an investigation into violations of city or county codes or ordinances based upon an anonymous complaint".

July 2021 vs 2020 reflects a 62% increase in self-initiated investigations by Community Service Officers on patrol.



Most of patrol activity focused on code enforcement violations and follow-up investigations.




### **July 2021 Code Enforcement Cases**



Total number of cases opened in the month of July increased by 107% between 2020 and 2021. The total number of cases closed in the month of July decreased by 59% between 2020 and 2021.



### July 27, 2021, Special Magistrate Hearing Cases


Largest number of magistrate cases were seasonal-related. Close to 20% of total cases were under the sea turtle protection ordinance. Construction without the proper city permits followed at a close second (17%). 15% cases were under environmental violations. 5% were repeat violations against the City of Marco Island's noise ordinance.

### July 2021 Monthly Beach Report

The number of events and time spent on beach related activities significantly increased vs last year at 167% and 68%, respectively. While the impact of COVID was an influence, 2 other factors played a strong role: 1. Code department's strengthened efforts behind the Sea Turtle ordinances: Lighting involvement (37 events for 2021 vs. 2 for 2020), beach holes filled (+250%); and 2. Increased beach presence by both police and code enforcement to ensure people could safely enjoy our beaches: patrol events (+65%), 911 call verifications (+285%), warnings on the beach (+350%). Additional educational efforts through social media, posters in store, and community outreach, supplemented patrol by promoting city ordinances.






