Re: June 2023 Monthly City Council Report

The Marco Island Police Department, as part of its mission statement, is dedicated to providing a safe and secure environment to the community it serves. This vison is multifaceted and requires inter/ intra agency cooperation, public relations, and community-oriented patrols. (In June 2023, the Marco Island Police Department strived to exercise this mission.)

As the school year came to an end, MIPD School Resource Officers began preparations for the Marco Island Police and Fire Youth Academy. This camp allowed participants to learn about law enforcement, fire service, and emergency medical services while opening a forum for communication with local officers and firefighters. Youth participants performed hands-on tasks and engaged with officers to expand their knowledge and interact with our local public servants.

Code Enforcement Officers Ira Warder and Eileen Zeidler are part of the Turtle Task Force, whose focus is to keep Marco's beaches safe and clean for nesting sea turtles. On June 12, 2023, NBC 2 took a ride along with officers to help residents and guests better understand how to protect this endangered species.

On June 21, 2023, Detective Michael Berndt, Officer Hans Schmid, and retired Sergeant Hector Diaz were recognized for their dedication to a safe and secure environment by being awarded the Collier County Emergency Medical Services Phoenix Award. Officers were awarded for their life saving efforts in reviving those individuals who have suffered a medical emergency. All sworn officers are trained in CPR and basic first aid which allows for them to utilize their skills to make informed and expedient decisions when assisting with a medical emergency. MIPD works in tandem with Marco Island Fire Rescue and Collier County EMS to provide rapid response to those in need of immediate medical care.



June Police Activity Crime report:

In June 2023, 56 incidents were reported to the Marco Island Police Department. In June 2023, all crime categories saw a decrease as compared to the same time last year. Total crimes against persons showed a decrease in 2023 due to a small drop in assault related crimes. Property crimes decreased by 9% in June 2023 due to a decrease in instances of criminal mischief/vandalism. Miscellaneous crimes also decreased due to a decrease in criminal traffic violations. In June 2023, crimes against society had a decrease due to a slight decrease in driving under the influence incidents and possession of narcotics. The Marco Island Police Department had 7 arrests in June of 2023 for incidents including criminal traffic, battery, DUI, narcotics, and arrests for warrants from out of county agencies.



This reporting aligns with new crime data collection requirements from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the FBI. This announcement for crime reporting was covered in the February 2022 monthly report.

Non-criminal incidents are reports that do not have a criminal offense or are information reports. Examples include fraud cases (outside of Marco Island jurisdiction), other agency assists, lost and found items and medical assists.


June Incident Crime Trends

In June 2023, there were 38 non-criminal incidents reported. 45% of non-criminal incident reports were comprised of suspicious activities including requests for trespass warnings, civil disputes, and internet/cyber scams. 13% of reports were referencing assistance to other agencies including Collier EMS, Marco Island Fire Department and other law enforcement agencies. 16% of non-criminal incident reports are for lost and found property.



June Traffic Patrol

In June 2023, there were 203 traffic citations and warnings issued by the Marco Island Police Department. Of the 69 citations issued, 28% were for failure to obey traffic signs or traffic lights. 31% of citations were for operating a motor vehicle with an expired registration or driver's license. Other citations issued were for violations including safety belt infractions, improper passing, and illegal U-turns. In June 2023, the Marco Island Police Department arrested 3 people for traffic violations. 2 arrests were for DUIs and 1 was for driving with a suspended license with knowledge of the suspension. 10 licenses were seized during traffic stops due to suspensions or revocations.



June Reserve / Auxiliary Program Activity Hours

Reserve and Auxiliary Police Officers are unpaid volunteers who are certified by the State of Florida to perform in the law enforcement role. These officers must meet the Department's and State of Florida's annual retraining / certification requirements. Reserve and Auxiliary personnel are required to volunteer a minimum of 16 hours per month. They perform a variety of functions for our department and community which are outlined in the chart below. Once a month Reserve and Auxiliary Officers have a staff meeting to review policy changes, attend training and address planning and logistical requirements.

June Marine Report

Officers assigned to the Marco Island Police Marine Unit conduct directed patrols of Marco Island waterways, city marinas, and boat ramps conducting boater safety education, vessel sanitation checks and enforcement activities. In June 2023 the Marine Unit welcomed Officers Ed Carey and Andy Smith who both completed their basic police vessel operator field training program.

Marine officers observed a decrease in boater traffic on Marco Island waterways and transient vessels at anchorage in Smoke House and Factory Bays during the month of June. Officers conducted vessel safety and sanitation inspections of anchored vessels on

Smokehouse and Factory bays. All vessels were following US Coast Guard regulations.

Beach Report

Patrol Events in June 2023 increased 5% compared to June 2022. Warnings for glass on the beach in June 2023 increased 25% as compared to last month. Code Enforcement Officers patrolling the beaches spent majority of their time giving directions, picking up litter and debris and reminding visitors and residents to stay cool and hydrated in the Florida Heat.

Code Enforcement:


There was an increase of 30% in the Notice of Violations issued this month as opposed to the same time last year. The most significant code violations for the month of June were trash on swale, overgrown weeds, and violations of erosion control devices. 80% of all Code Enforcement investigations resulted in issuance of a Notice of Violation which is a small increase in the ratio as of this time last year. The City's Landscaping registration initiative has identified 216 landscapers on Marco Island, 143 of which have registered. 78 Notice of Violations have been issued for lack of compliance with the initiative.





Code Enforcement Protected Species

Sea turtle nesting season began on May 1st and continues until October 31st. All lighting visible from the beach must be turned off by 9:00 PM. Holes on the beach must be filled to prevent turtle disorientation or traps. To report an injured or sea turtle issue please notify one of the following immediately:


Code Officers also ensure the safety of other local wildlife including Gopher Tortoises, Burrowing Owls, and other shorebirds by enforcing local protected Species Ordinances.

Code Enforcement: Water Quality

During the month of June of 2023, Code Enforcement issued a total of 44 Notices of Violation, for MS4, Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System. 38 violations were for missing or damaged silt fences. Of the 38 violations, 31 met compliance within the required compliance date and 7 were non-compliant and are scheduled for July Magistrate.

The remaining 6 violations were for Illicit Discharge violations. 4 cases met compliance within the required compliance date, and 2 are scheduled for July Magistrate.

Improperly installed silt fences, or lack of a silt fence can allow a significant number of pollutants to enter our waterways or reach surface or ground waters. Enforcement of MS4 violations continues to be a priority for Marco Island.





