Re: May 2023 Monthly City Council Report

Collaboration with the community, as well as with neighboring agencies is of upmost importance to the Marco Island Police Department. The Marco Island Police Department in tandem with the Florida Wildlife Commission, kicked off May 2023 by identifying Sea Turtles migrating to our local beaches to lay their eggs. Protecting endangered species ensures that Florida's ecosystems remain intact and in balance.

In partnership with the Collier County Sheriff's Office SWAT team, the Marco Island Police Department was able to conclude a 6-month investigation with the arrest of a 26-year-old suspect. The suspect was charged with 8 counts of possession of child pornography and 2 counts of intent to distribute child pornography. This collaboration and partnership across jurisdictional boundaries are how agencies can increase public safety, ensure justice for victims and improve communication from agency to agency.

We also joined other agencies in remembering fallen heroes in May 2023. May 15th, 2023, marked Peace Officers Memorial Day, where MIPD members bowed their heads to remember those service members who had fallen in the line of duty. On May 16th, Marco Island Police Department members and MIPD's Honor Guard joined Collier County Sheriff's Office at the Annual Law Enforcement Memorial. On Memorial Day, The Marco Island Police Department Honor Guard joined community members at Veterans Community Park to honor our respected fallen service members.



May Police Activity Crime report:

In May 2023, 79 incidents were reported to the Marco Island Police Department. Crimes against persons showed a slight increase in 2023, due to higher occurrences of sex offenses. Property crimes remained consistent with data from May 2022. Miscellaneous crimes decreased due to fewer instances of criminal traffic violations. In May 2023, crimes against society had a substantial increase due to both driving under the influence incidents and narcotics offenses. The Marco Island Police Department had 9 arrests in May of 2023 for criminal traffic offenses, shoplifting, DUI, Narcotics and Possession and Distribution of Child Pornography.



This reporting aligns with new crime data collection requirements from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the FBI. This announcement for crime reporting was covered in the February 2022 monthly report.

Non-criminal incidents are reports that do not have a criminal offense or are information reports. Examples include fraud cases (outside of Marco Island jurisdiction), other agency assists, lost and found items and medical assists.

May Incident Trends

In May 2023, there were 46 non-criminal incidents reported. 48% of non-criminal incident reports were comprised of information only reports including requests for legal advice, civil disputes, and trespass warnings. 15% of reports were referencing assistance to other agencies including Collier EMS, Marco Island Fire Department, and other law enforcement agencies. 11% of non-criminal incident reports are for lost and found property. The Marco Island Police Department will accept found property into our property and evidence department for safekeeping until an owner can be located.




May Traffic Patrol

Major Incident

In May 2023, there were 136 traffic citations and warning issued by the Marco Island Police Department. Of the 53 citations issued 45% were for failure to obey traffic signs or traffic lights. 25% of citations were for operating a motor vehicle with an expired registration or driver's license. Other citations issued were for violations including safety belt infractions, improper passing, and illegal U-turns.

In May 2023, the Marco Island Police Department arrested 3 people for DUIs.

12 licenses were seized during traffic stops due to suspensions or revocations.




Quarterly Crash Report

The Marco Island Police Department collects crash information data quarterly to help determine which conditions, participants and circumstances are more likely to result in an accident. The heat map shows the geographic location of the areas with the highest concentration of reported crashes. Areas where crashes are more densely concentrated will appear on the heat map as a "hotter" location, indicated by red or orange color. Crashes that are more severe will also appear "hotter" to reflect a more severe accident occurrence.

On March 1, 2023, the Governor approved Senate Bill 1614, which expanded public records exemptions to Crash Reports and Uniform Traffic Citations. Due to this change, crash report data became exempt from public disclosure for 60 days after the date of the crash occurrence. Q1 crash data was available for review beginning on May 1, 2023.

In Q1 (January- March 2023), 111 crashes were reported within the municipal city limits of Marco Island. This quarter saw a significant increase in crashes (+88%) as compared to Q4 (October- December 2022). Of the 111 reported crashes, 85% were non- injury related and 87% were in clear weather conditions. Most accidents were between 8 am and 4pm, with concentrations in the middle of the week (Wednesday and Thursday). Data showed that the majority of the accidents involved drivers 65 years of age or older and that male drivers were responsible for 67% of accidents. January had the most crashes in Q1 with the least reported in March. There were 2 alcohol/ impaired driver related crashes in Q1, comprising 2% of total crash events.





May Reserve / Auxiliary Program Activity Hours

Reserve and Auxiliary Police Officers are unpaid volunteers who are certified by the State of Florida to perform in the law enforcement role. These officers must meet the Department's and State of Florida's annual retraining / certification requirements. Reserve and Auxiliary personnel are required to volunteer a minimum of 16 hours per month. They perform a variety of functions for our department and community which are outlined in the chart below. Once a month Reserve and Auxiliary Officers have a staff meeting to review policy changes, attend training and address planning and logistical requirements.

May Marine Report

Officers assigned to the Marco Island Police Marine Unit patrolled all of Marco Island waterways, city marinas, and boat ramps. During the week of May 20-26th, Marine Officers participated in the National Safe Boating week campaign by conducting boater safety education and enforcement activities. Boater safety week focused on boater education, weather and conditional awareness, responsible boating practices and the importance of wearing a life vest.

On May 14th, officers responded to the beach on a reported unresponsive male. Officers beached their vessel and assisted in rendering aid in the form of CPR to the patient until paramedics arrived on scene to continue treatment.



May Code Enforcement:

The Code Enforcement unit uses focused patrol to enforce issues that are of high importance to the residents of Marco Island. May 1st began night inspections for enforcement of the sea turtle lighting ordinance. In May 2023, the most common violation type remained to be "Placement of Waste at Curb" violations for trash cans on the swale at the incorrect time or date. 115 landscaping companies have now registered under the new Landscaper Registration requirement.



Code Enforcement Protected Species

May 1st signified the beginning of Sea Turtle Nesting Season on Marco Island. The Code Enforcement Department focuses efforts to ensure the safe migration and incubation of nesting grounds by enforcing the sea turtle lighting ordinance and reminding residents and guests to keep the beach clear from debris and obstructions.

Code Enforcement: Water quality

During the month of May 2023, Code Enforcement issued a total of 27 Notices of Violation, for Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4).

24 violations were issued for Silt Fence, either damaged or missing. 19 violations were corrected by the scheduled compliance due date. 7 are still non-compliant, with 6 listed for the June 27th Magistrate.

4 violations were issued for Illicit Discharge. Two were corrected by the scheduled due date and 2 remain open and will be scheduled for a future Magistrate date.









Low- Speed vehicle crash with injuries
