Re:	September 2023 Monthly City Council Report

In September, the MIPD hosted the Marco Island Chamber of Commerce's Leadership Marco Law Enforcement Day. Students of the 2023 Leadership Marco class participated in a full day interactive experience learning about multiple facets of law enforcement and criminal justice. Lieutenant Gallup and Officer Prigge instructed participants on topics including Traffic Stops, DUI Enforcement, Crime Scene Processing, Code Enforcement, and other related topics. This opportunity allowed members of the community to receive a close-up interactive experience connecting with members of our department. It is a mission of the Marco Island Police Department to strengthen community ties by providing agency transparency and opportunities for open dialogue. Leadership Marco Law Enforcement Day is always a well- received event, which provides members of the public and law enforcement personnel the opportunity to spend quality time together resulting in a learning experience for all participants.

### **September Police Activity**

#### Crime report:

In September 2023, 67 incidents were reported to the Marco Island Police Department. Total crimes against persons showed a 67% decrease in 2023. An increase in instances of property crimes occurred in September 2023. Miscellaneous crimes showed a decrease due to fewer criminal traffic citations issued. In September 2023, crimes against society had an increase due to driving under the influence and narcotics incidents. The Marco Island Police Department had 10 arrests in September of 2023 for incidents including criminal traffic, assault, narcotics, DUI, and obstruction of a law enforcement officer.



This reporting aligns with new crime data collection requirements from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the FBI. This announcement for crime reporting was covered in the February 2022 monthly report.

Non-criminal incidents are reports that do not have a criminal offense or are information reports. Examples include fraud cases (outside of Marco Island jurisdiction), other agency assists, lost and found items and medical assists.


#### September Incident Crime Trends

In September 2023, there were 34 non-criminal incidents reported. 50% of non- criminal incident reports comprised suspicious activities including online scam reports, trespassing and non- criminal, juvenile related incidents. 9% of reports were referencing assistance to other agencies including Collier EMS, Marco Island Fire Department, and other law enforcement agencies. 15% of non-criminal incident reports are for lost and found property. The Marco Island Police Department investigates all reports of suspicious activity to determine if a crime has occurred.



#### **September Traffic Patrol**

In September 2023, there were 253 traffic citations and warnings issued by the Marco Island Police Department. Of the citations issued, 28% were for failure to obey traffic signs or traffic lights. 33% of citations were for operating a motor vehicle with an expired registration or driver's license. Other citations issued were for violations including safety belt infractions, improper passing, and illegal U-turns. In September 2023, the Marco Island Police Department arrested 7 individuals for traffic violations. 3 arrests were for DUIs, and 4 were arrested for driving with an invalid or suspended driver's license. 8 licenses and 1 vehicle tag were seized during traffic stops due to suspensions or revocations.

#### August Reserve / Auxiliary Program Activity Hours

Reserve and Auxiliary Police Officers are unpaid volunteers who are certified by the State of Florida to perform in the law enforcement role. These officers must meet the Department's and State of Florida's annual retraining / certification requirements. Reserve and Auxiliary personnel are required to volunteer a minimum of 16 hours per month. They perform a variety of functions for our department and community which are outlined in the chart below. Once a month Reserve and Auxiliary Officers have a staff meeting to review policy changes, attend training and address planning and logistical requirements.

Aggravated Battery – An unknown subject had a dispute 10tal 67 88 -24% with the victim and struck them with a wooden object causing injury. The investigation did not reveal any suspect information. Case Inactive.

**Grand Theft Auto** – A vehicle was stolen from a shopping plaza. The vehicle is listed as stolen, and there are no further leads to pursue. Case inactive pending future vehicle recovery.

**Death Investigation** – A death investigation was ruled to be from natural causes by the District 20 Medical Examiner. Case closed.

**Sex Offender Check** – Detectives contacted a sex offender visiting the island and served him with the sex offender ordinance. Compliance with the requirements was confirmed and the subject left the city as required. Case closed. **Uttering a Forged Check** – a report was investigated which led to the discovery that the crime occurred outside of the city limits. Case was referred to the proper law enforcement agencies.

**Aid to Other Agency** – Detectives collected information from a local business which was the victim of check fraud outside the area. Reports were forwarded to the appropriate law enforcement agencies with jurisdiction.

**Burglary Conveyance** – After a review of video surveillance and all evidence available, there was not enough to positively identify a suspect. Case Inactive.

**Risk Protection Orders** – Detectives evaluated two expiring RPOs for legal grounds to justify extension. One expired and the other was extended after a court hearing determined that criteria to qualify for an extension was met.

**Grand Theft** – After extensive investigation, a report of a possible grand theft of supplies turned out to be a civil issue. Case Closed.




#### **Code Enforcement:**

In September the Code Enforcement Unit continued to respond to the issues that are of importance to the residents of Marco Island. The self-initiated case increase shows that dedication to ensure the overall beauty and conservation of Marco Island. There was an increase of 24% of Notice of Violations issued this month as opposed to the same time last year. The most significant code violations for the month of September were overgrown grass and weeds (18-36(10)), litter and debris (18-36(9)) and encroachment. This month there is also a 39% increase in self-initiated cases.

## Cases Opened and Closed Sept 2023 vs. Sept 2022







#### **Code Enforcement Protected Species**

**Burrowing Owls**- This month we had 9 code calls involving burrowing owl violations. All incidents involved protection zone violations. 3 of the cases were unfounded. 6 cases resulted in the issuance of Notices of Violations, (NOV's). Of these 6 cases, 5 involved compromised silt fence perimeters on construction sites. 1 case involved working too close to an owl burrow.

**Other Birds**- We had 1 case involving a beach goer flushing (chasing) nesting shore birds. The subject was educated and given a verbal warning.



**Gopher Torties-** We had 3 cases this month, all involving protection zone violations. Of these 3 cases, 2 NOV's were issued, and 1 citation was issued.

Manatees- Thankfully, no cases were reported regarding injured Manatees.

**Sea Turtles** – Although our Sea Turtle season runs through October 31<sup>st</sup>, there are no longer any nests on the main beach. There are two nests at the beginning of the Critical Wildlife Area (CWA) that are still being monitored.

#### **Code Enforcement: Water Quality**

During the month of September 2023, Code Enforcement issued a total of 31 Notices of Violation for MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) violations.

A total of 26 Notice of Violations were issued for missing or damaged Silt Fences. Of the 26, 16 were compliant and closed. 10 cases remain Open/Non-Compliant and will be scheduled for a future Magistrate hearing.

Five notices were issued for Storm Water Pollution/Illicit Discharge violations. All five cases remain Open/Non-Compliant and will be scheduled for a future Magistrate Hearing.

MS4 violations are monitored closely as they contribute to poor water quality by allowing pollutants to enter the city waterways.
