Did you know?

Sewage reduces oxygen levels in the water that fish and other aquatic species need to survive.

Since the microorganisms within the sewage need oxygen, any discharge into waterways reduces the amount of oxygen available to fish and other aquatic life.

Heavy nutrient loads in sewage also promote excessive algae growth preventing life-giving sunlight from reaching subsurface vegetation.

Untreated sewage from one 20-gallon holding tank can have the same amount of bacteria as 10,000 gallons of treated sewage!

Its the law!

- Carry a trash bag
- Stow loose items
- Break apartplastic six-packrings
- Dispose of line
- Recycle glass metal, plastic, batteries, oil

- Use onshore restrooms whenever possible before leaving for a boat trip.
- 2 Waste dump receptacles to reduce or eliminate the discharge of sewage into our waters.
- Always know where your waste goes and make sure it doesn't enter directly into the water.
- If you have a flow-through treatment system, make sure it is working properly and that all your waste goes through the system.
- Use enzyme-based products in your holding tank instead of deodorizers and disinfectants which contain chemicals harmful to aquatic life.

- Federal law requires boats with on-board heads (toilets) to use a U.S Coast Guard certified Marine Sanitation Device (MSD), preferably a type III that is pumped out on-shore.
- The Federal Clean Water
 Act prohibits the discharge
 of untreated sewage from a
 vessel within 3 nautical
 miles of shore. Penalties
 can be up to \$25,000!

In Florida, statute 327.53
prohibits boaters from
discharging sewage extending 9
miles out into the Gulf of
Mexico or 3 miles out in the
Atlantic Ocean.
Penalties can be severe!
